SCOMATI is a three county coalition of existing drug coalitions, health departments, law enforcement agencies, schools, pharmacies, and community action agencies, partnering to address gaps in access to MAT, naloxone, and supportive services. SCOMATI would like to assist agencies in developing standards operating procedures to ensure high-risk populations have access to needed services through assessments and linkages to care. SCOMATI will implement 3 new MAT access points – in a pharmacy through tele-health, through a police department, and through the local re-entry coalition. SCOMATI will also implement additional SUD supports through the regions' health system's school-based wellness services.

<p>Goal 1: Establish new MAT access points to provide both medications and supportive services to individuals with OUD and/or AUD in rural communities.</p> <p>Goal 2: Enhance the MAT workforce through recruitment, training, and the development of peer mentorship networks.</p>

Goal 3: Build community capacity and infrastructure to support more effective and efficient MAT service provision.

Goal 4: Ensure sustainability of the new MAT access points through improved billing and coding as well as enrollment of eligible individuals into health insurance. Target rural counties area located in the Ozark Mountains, with rolling hills and numerous traversing streams which result in many geographically-isolated areas. Five of the seven counties are considered Level 4 Frontier and Remote Areas, the highest degree of geographic remoteness. Target area counties are also located in the Missouri Delta Region—an area prone to frequent flooding. Poverty throughout the Delta area is more than 10% higher than the nation, and counties in the Delta region also have disproportionately worse health outcomes compared to the nation.

The combination of scarce resources, pervasive poverty, and substantial risk factors for OUD/AUD and mental health issues, as well as overall poor health outcomes of the region, requires MHHC and the partners identified in this grant application to proactively work together in order to mitigate the adverse effects of OUD/AUD.

<p>MCHS is establishing a new access point for MAT services in Plymouth, NC, located in Washington County. In addition to primary medical care, dental services, and a 340B pharmacy, the new RCORP-MAT access point in Plymouth will provide OUD and AUD treatment services as well as behavioral health and peer support services both at the physical location of the Plymouth health center, via telehealth, and in the MCHS Mobile Unit, which will be used to offer outreach services to the most rural and remote regions of the proposed service area to serve those with transportation challenges. MCHS will offer extended hours and weekend hours to ensure accessibility to the target population. MCHS will build community capacity and infrastructure to support more effective and efficient MAT service</p>

provision by partnering with Washington County and Martin County Sheriff Departments, local Police Departments, jails, Washington Regional Medical (rural hospital), the NC Office of Rural Health, and a local pharmacy. These partnerships help identify those individuals in need of MAT services for referral, aid in the recruitment of qualified clinicians to deliver services, and act as an additional resource for access to prescribed medications for clients. MCHS will use evidence-based practices and FDA-approved medication options for OUD, including buprenorphine and naltrexone to meet the needs of each patient most effectively.

Project Summary

Prestera Center for Mental Health Services, Inc has proposed to add new medication assisted treatment (MAT) access points that serve adults eighteen years and older with opioid use disorder (OUD) and/or alcohol use disorder (AUD) across six rural West Virginia counties: Boone, Mason, Lincoln, Clay, Monroe and Summers counties. These counties are each physically located in HRSA-designated rural areas (as defined by the Rural Health Grants Eligibility Analyzer). These counties were selected because there are either few or no MAT providers currently located in each county. Establishing one new MAT access point in each of six rural counties, increasing MAT capacity and sustaining MAT services in these rural counties, is consistent with HRSA mission, goals and purposes. Population demographics and social determinants of health reveal a disadvantaged population base. Appalachians have historically suffered from poorer health outcomes, health disparities and other inequities compared to the rest of the US population. Transportation, childcare and the availability of support groups are barriers to accessing services. Distinct and different cultural group compared to the larger US population. Lower-than-average levels of educational attainment and wages, high unemployment rate, high disability rates, and high poverty rates typically characterize the Appalachian population and confound overall health and well-being, historically suffered from poorer health outcomes, health disparities, and other inequities (compared to the rest of the population) include people living with SUD, living in poverty, people identifying with one or more racial or ethnic minority group, individuals experiencing homelessness, individuals experiencing pregnancy, people with a disability, the elderly, and LGBTQ+ populations. These segments of the target population require deliberate outreach into their communities to ensure everyone has an equal opportunity to participate in services.

<p>Project POWER – Preventing Opioid use disorder and overdoses With Emerging Resources in rural South Carolina aims to improve health care in three rural counties and one partially rural county in South Carolina (SC), including Laurens, Greenwood, Oconee and Abbeville, by establishing 11 new MAT access points and increasing the capacity for sustainable MAT service provision in rural areas. Two mobile health clinics (MHC) will operate in all four rural county locations, five primary care clinics will begin to offer MAT in three rural counties (Laurens, Greenwood, and Oconee), one rural emergency department (ED) operating in Laurens County will conduct Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) and MAT initiation with next-day referral, and one rural county jail operating in Oconee County will begin initiating MAT. Project POWER will also apply new academic detailing efforts, ongoing regular office hours, real-time phone and virtual care, and a learning collaborative to support new MAT champions and other team members.</p>
